**PETERBOROUGH, ON – March 11, 2026** – Parks Canada invites members of the public to participate in upcoming **Public Information Sessions** regarding infrastructure projects taking place in Peterborough along the Trent–Severn Waterway National Historic Site.

Contractors are on site, and in the coming weeks, work will begin on coordinated, multi-year infrastructure projects in Peterborough that include the rehabilitation of the Peterborough Earth Dams, repairs and maintenance of the Peterborough Lift Lock, and the replacement of the Maria Street Swing Bridge.
